his year's HIA Home of the Year oozes French provincial charm and offers quality and luxury in spades. About 1000 building-industry representatives saw the Malyern-based builder, Montage Developments, recently receive this prestigious award in a gala ceremony at the Melbourne Convention Centre.

It was a big night for Montage, taking home four awards.

The builder, which picked up gongs in the Spec Homes Overall and Spec Homes over \$500,000 categories for the same house, has produced a four-bedroom Kew residence packed with glowing features.

The home, designed by architect Phillip Mannerheim, was built with growing family and school-age children in mind because it sits in the heart of a private-school belt, and is within walking distance of some of these educational institutions.

Montage Developments, which had already built homes in the area for several families with school-age children, also wanted a visually

Its large kitchen and entertaining areas are equally well suited to feeding a large tribe after school.

And the 3m ceilings on both floors add to the home's sense of light and space.

Among the impressive features are a stone hallway, luxurious formal and informal living areas, study, retreat and north-facing entertaining area. Importantly, the house was designed to complement its surroundings, including the landscaping.

Judges said the home showed a high-quality finish, good attention to detail and respect for its surroundings.

Lawrey says: "One of the best features of the home is the effective use. of natural light, with large windows and bifold doors framing the view to the back yard and helping to create a feeling of space.

"The design successfully captures the often challenging balance between elegance and homeliness. The high-quality finish and craftsmanship are also standout features."

Caroline says the layout caters well to the needs of a developing or mature family because it offers four large bedrooms and a study or

She adds all members of the family are catered for because the home has an upstairs retreat, as well as a ground-level family/meals zone and a separate formal living/dining area.

\*From the outside the French Provincial design is simple, yet striking, without being overpowering, and is respectful of the character of neighbouring homes," Caroline adds.


